AF 2007 MEDAL AWARDS

LOIS DODD, N.A.

More than 25 years ago, the late art historian Milton W. Brown wrote: “[Lois] Dodd is an artist of intelligence. Her paintings are logical, neat, and cool. She observes nature or reality with intensity rather than passion, searching for the moment of truth that is somehow revealing. But

her vision is quite personal, even idiosyncratic, and what she comes up with is often surprising...”

Primarily a landscape painter, Dodd says: “Over the years painting, my preoccupation has shifted from an interest in shape to a depiction of space and the revelation of the hidden geometry in nature. I feel I am following an endlessly exciting visual road, both figuratively and sometimes actually, which is the path of my life.” After attending The Cooper Union from 1945 to 1948, she co-founded the Tanager Gallery, one of the first artist-run galleries in

New York, and exhibited her work there until 1962. Although she established herself in the nineteen fifties, then the pinnacle of Abstract Expressionism, she remained faithful to her own concept of representation. From 1971 to 1992, she taught at Brooklyn College. She is an elected member of the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, the National Academy of Design (1989), and has been on the Board of Governors of Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture since 1980. She is a recipient of the Longview Foundation Purchase Award; Ingram-Merrill Foundation Grant; and the Henry Ward Ranger Fund Purchase Award, National Academy. Her work is included in a number of private and public collections. Among them

are the collections of Brooklyn College, Colby College, Cooper-Hewitt Museum, National Academy, Wadsworth Athenaeum, and Readers Digest. Lois Dodd is represented by Alexandre Gallery in NY.

MUSEUM OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK SUSAN HENSHAW JONES, PRESIDENT AND DIRECTOR

The Museum of the City of New York was founded in 1923 and located at Gracie Mansion. Its present home, at Fifth Avenue and 103rd Street, was built in 1929 on city-owned land and completed in 1932.

The museum has a unique mandate—to “engage visitors in exploring the past, present, and future of the five boroughs of New York City...” and to delve into the city’s amazing cultural diversity. Susan Henshaw Jones, President and Director, states:

“...We have the opportunity to present a wide variety of exhibitions, public programs, and publications, all investigating what gives New York its singular character.”

The museum’s collections are vast and diverse. Its costumes and textiles collection, for example, contains over 27,000 garments and accessories worn by New Yorkers from the 17th century to the present. The decorative arts collection includes New York silver, room settings dating from the early 19th century, fine examples of furniture made by New York cabinetmakers, Chinese export porcelain once owned by New Yorkers, and other decorative materials made in New York from the 1770s to the mid-20th century. Recent exhibits have included: *A City on Paper: Saul Steinberg’s New York*, *Theater Drawings by Robert Miles Parker* and *Creative New York: Portraits by Everett Raymond Kinstler*. The museum currently is undergoing major expansion and renovations scheduled for completion in 2012.

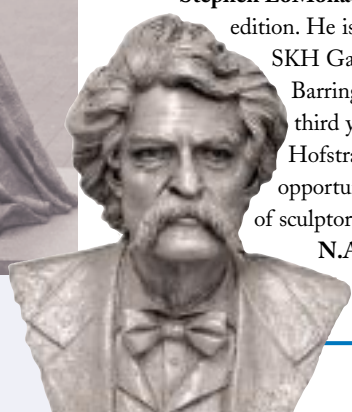

The January 2007 issue of *Fine Art Connoisseur Magazine* features the work of **Sherry Camhy** as its frontispiece. She also was a panelist at the Art Students League presentation of "Why the Nude." The 2006 Annual Thumb-Box Exhibition at the Salmagundi Club gave **David Band** the D. Wu and Elsie Ject-Key Memorial Award for oil or watercolor, and he received the Ogden Pleissner Award at the club's 2007 All Media Combined Exhibition. **Dale Meyers** won the Loring W. Coleman Award at the Allied Artists of America exhibition in November. Pasco Hernandez Community College (PHCC) of New Port Richey, FL, held a 50-year retrospective show of watercolors and drawings by **John M. Angelini**, AWS, and M.A.A. 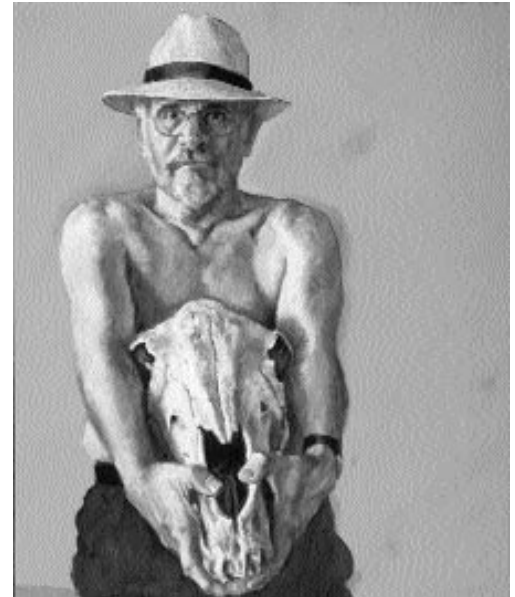

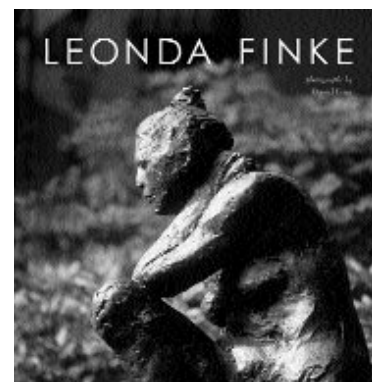

AF 2006 MEDAL AWARDS



MORTON KAISH, N.A.

John Gruen called him "...A latter-day Bonnard, richly gifted in the warm and supple manipulation of paint..." And John Canaday once wrote, "If there is a man alive who enjoys painting more than Mr. Kaish does, he hasn't had a show recently. When he gets into that area of his palette where the reds, oranges and fuchsias are laid out he is most exuberant of all."

In his own words, Morton Kaish writes, "Much of the time we seem to make our way through Life's clutter, training loose ends and bits of unfinished business. Still, for brief shimmering moments we become the sum of ourselves—and the world opens wide."

Born in New Jersey, Kaish received his BFA degree at Syracuse University and continued his studies at the Academie de la Grande Chaumiere, Paris, Instituto d'Arte in Florence, and the Academia delle Bella Arti, Rome. In 1989, Syracuse University awarded him its Distinguished Alumni Award for Achievement in the Fine Arts.

His work is included in a number of public, private, university, and corporate collections. Among them are the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of Art, the British Museum, and other major museums.

Elected to The National Academy of Design in 1988, he has since received their Andrew Carnegie Prize, Benjamin Altman Landscape Prize, Gervasi Award for Painting, the William A. Paton Award, and the Obrig Prize for Watercolor. Twice he received the William Ward Ranger Purchase Fund Award. The State University of New York has appointed him Faculty Exchange Scholar, and he is a professor in the School of Art and Design at FIT/SUNY where he has been awarded a New York State Research Grant for work in experimental media.

THE VERMONT STUDIO CENTER

In 1984, Jonathan Gregg and Louise von Weise founded the Vermont Studio Center as a non-profit year-round "international creative community" for artists and writers who wished to work in a peaceful, open, non-judgmental environment.

Located in the heart of the Green Mountains, considered one of the most beautiful regions in the United States, the Studio Center plays host to sculptors, painters, photographers, printmakers, mixed media artists, poets, and writers. The center accepts many artists for residencies and those who cannot afford the cost may be awarded full or partial fellowships based on merit.

Residencies include private living quarters, private studio space, and three meals a day. Stays can be as short as one month or as long as three months. Those who cannot afford the cost of residency can take part in a work-study program such as working five or 10 hours a week in the kitchen, offices or as part of the maintenance crew.

As the country's largest artists' community, the Studio Center selects approximately 55 artists and writers as residents per month. In addition, it offers the benefit of seven distinguished visiting artists and writers per month, each spending a week presenting their own work and being available to residents for individual studio visits, writing workshops, and lectures. In 2005, the Studio Center was host to residents from 42 countries.
