AF 2010 MEDAL AWARDS



MILTON ESTEROW EDITOR/PUBLISHER, ARTNEWS GARI MELCHERS MEMORIAL MEDAL

ilton Esterow is editor and publisher of ARTnews. Since he bought ARTnews from Newsweek Magazine in 1972, he has guided its growth into the most widely circulated art magazine in the world. Under his direction,

ARTnews became the first publication to consistently apply rigorous standards of investigative reporting to the art world. Since 1975, ARTnews has won most of the major journalism awards presented to magazines.

Mr. Esterow received a special award for lifetime achievement from the College Art Association, the national organization of educators, artists, art historians, curators, critics, and institutions in 2003. He was cited for having "overseen the magazine's financial success while enhancing its reputation and influence in the visual-arts community and beyond." The association also praised Mr. Esterow for "his exceptional contributions to art journalism and investigative art reporting." The New York State Art Teachers Association awarded a special citation to Mr. Esterow "in recognition of distinguished scholarship, pioneering leadership in investigative reporting in the visual arts, and in appreciation of his exemplary achievements and contributions to journalism, criticism, and education in the visual arts."

In 1981, ARTnews won two of the most coveted journalism awards when it became the first magazine to receive a George Polk Award for cultural reporting and the first fine-arts magazine to win a National Magazine Award for general excellence. The Society of the Silurians, an organization of veteran reporters and editors from the New York metropolitan area, has cited ARTnews ten times for distinguished investigative reporting. ARTnews has also received journalism awards from The Association of Women in Communications, Investigative Reporters and Editors, the Newspaper Guild of New York, and the Press Club of Atlantic City.

In 1992, ARTnews received another George Polk Award for a "remarkable East-West journalistic collaboration"—a series of articles by Konstantin Akinsha and Grigorii Kozlov revealing that cultural treasures seized by the Red Army in Germany during World War II were still hidden in depositories in the former Soviet Union. Akinsha and Kozlov were the first Soviet print journalists to win the award. The series was also cited by the Overseas Press Club, which gave ARTnews an award for excellence in magazine reporting.

In 1996, the Committee for Jewish Claims on Austria presented an award to Mr. Esterow "in gratitude" for the magazine's role, starting with an article by Andrew Decker, in Austria's decision to transfer to the Jewish Community of Vienna ownership of thousands of artworks stolen by the Nazis from victims of the Holocaust.

Born in New York City, Mr. Esterow was a reporter for The New York Times and specialized in cultural affairs. He was a member of The Times' drama and film departments and later wrote frequently about the art world. Mr. Esterow has lectured extensively both in the United States and abroad. He is the author of *The Art Stealers*, published by Macmillan.

he lyrical work of Painter/Printmaker Robert Kipniss comprises austere landscapes and enigmatic interiors. The subject, however, is only the vehicle for his expression. Kipniss says, "If

someone looks at my paintings and sees only trees and houses, then they don't see what I'm doing. I may be painting trees and houses, but when I look at them, that's not what I see; I see an atmosphere, a moment, a quickly passing experience that I'm trying to capture. My art is of intensity, of delving, of exploring the soul."

Mr. Kipniss' early interest in art was encouraged and nurtured by his parents, who were both artists. His training began at the Art Students League in New York City, where he was born in 1931. While in college at the University of Iowa, he earned an undergraduate degree in English Literature and later a Masters of Fine Art in Painting and Art History. It was not until the 1960s that Kipniss began exploring drypoints, lithographs and intaglio.

His numerous awards have resulted in his election to the National Academy of Design in New York in 1980, the Royal Society of Painter-Printmakers in London in 1998 and a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Society of American Graphic Artists in New York in 2007. He has received Honorary Doctorates from Illinois College, Jacksonville, Illinois and Wittenberg University, Springfield, Ohio.

Mr. Kipniss' paintings, prints and drawings are in the permanent collections of The Art Institute of Chicago; Bibliotheque Nationale de France; The British Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum, London; The Boston Athenaeum and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; ; Carnegie Museum of Art, Philadelphia; Fitzwilliam Museum, University of Cambridge; Los Angeles County Museum of Art; The Metropolitan Museum of Art, The Morgan Library and the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Pinakothek der Moderne,






Left: Nocturne: Still Life with Two Vases, mezzotint, 19-1/2" x 13" 2004 worldwide.





This fall, Joyce Zeller's portrait of U.S. Attorney General Michael Mukasey was unveiled. It will hang in the Justice Department in Washington, DC. Michael Del Priore painted the portrait of Congressman Christopher H. Smith. Mr. Del Priore also traveled to paint Judges Patrick Dugan of Detroit, MI and John Waites of South Carolina. In 2010, Del Priore painted the President of Lewis and Clark College, Tom Hochstettler, and CEO James Ferrell of the Ferrell Gas Company in Texas. The Butler Institute of American Art presented Florian K. Lawton's "Fifty Years of Art," a retrospective of the celebrated Ohio artist's work, curated by Henry Adams, former curator of American Art at the Cleveland Museum of Art. Annette Blaugrund, while serving on several boards, is the author of a new book entitled, Beauty Was Her Business: The Adventures of Harriet Hubbard Ayer. Ms. Blaugrund continues to consult with art organizations throughout the country. Terry Brown has lectured this year in Stockbridge MA, Yonkers, NY and in Detroit, MI. Terry is an adjunct Professor in Art History at TheArtDepartment.com. Celebrated Connecticut artist, Christine Ivers, a signature member of the Pastel Society of America, was chosen as one of America's top 100 Pastelists to be featured in the June issue of Pastel Journal. Barbara Nessim became the first Artist Laureate of the Norman Rockwell Museum and is currently mounting several solo exhibitions at the Sienna Gallery (Lenox, MA), DFN Gallery and Conde Nast (New York, NY), and Westfield State College (Westfield, MA). Ms. Nessim is at present completing a 9-part mural installation, which includes a 28-foot, 2-story-tall piece in Event, a Kimpton Hotel, opening this spring in Chelsea. The Natchez Mississippi Historical Foundation hosts a one-person exhibition by Rolland Golden. Robert Stark presents an Open Studio exhibition





he parlors and the bar of the National Arts Club were packed with festively dressed Artists' Fellowship members and guests chatting and laughing, sipping and munching while pianist Chuck Folds and later Michael Bard and his jazz band played. A bell rang and the celebration of the Artists' Fellowship 150th Anniversary began with the evening's big event, "Small Art, Big Help," in which donated artwork would boost the Fellowship's endowment.

Everyone migrated to stand in front of one of seven draped panels, under which 140 artworks, each 6" x 9", were concealed. Each was priced at \$200 and was signed only on the back, the artists' names to be revealed after the purchase was finalized. Eyes focused. A hush. The drapes were removed revealing the paintings. It was dizzying to try to absorb

each piece on the panel, and, if one was hoping to find the work of a particular artist, to see if it was on that panel. A polite frenzy, with volunteers helping buyers secure their choices and more volunteers registering purchases and taking checks and credit cards. Within an hour more than half the paintings had sold, and before the evening was over, they were almost all gone. A few calls after the evening to people who had been unable to attend placed the remaining few paintings in happy Fellowship supporters' hands.

Of those looking for work by a particular artist, some did choose the right panel but

failed to "see" the piece they wanted. The work was all good and it was surprisingly hard to identify the artists work without signatures. A few were lucky, some were flummoxed, but all seemed delighted with their treasures and the adventure of the evening.

As the kerfuffle subsided, another bell sounded and the party moved to the grand gallery for dinner and the evening's program. Buyers were comparing their acquisitions and everyone enjoyed a crowded but festive and joyful dinner celebrating the Artists' Fellowship's 150 anniversary.

Once all were seated, President Babette Bloch welcomed us, thanked the many volunteers who made the art sale work so smoothly, and also thanked O. Aldon James and The National Arts Club for donating the space for the event.

Cheers arose from the 250 celebrants when a proclamation from Mayor Bloomberg was read, declaring September 23, 2009 to be "Artists' Fellowship Day."

A special award was then presented to The Artists' Fellowship itself.

Assembled at the podium were representatives of many of our sister organizations, each a former Artists' Fellowship Awards Dinner honoree. Included were leaders of the National Arts Club, the Salmagundi Club, the National Academy of Design, the Art Students League, and the Pastel Society of America. Accepting the award on behalf of The Fellowship were Babette Bloch and former Presidents Fay Moore, Everett Raymond Kinstler, and Marc Mellon.

The highlight of the evening of the evening was the presentation of the Gari

artist, AF advisor and Fellowship president from 1968-1970, who received the Clinedinst Medal in 1985; and Pam Singleton, Fellowship treasurer since 1997 and Trustee since the 1970's. Each spoke briefly after receiving the medal from President Bloch. The Gari Melchers medal is awarded to a person or organization that

has materially furthered the interest of the fine arts.

The 150 paintings that were offered for sale were donated by Artists' Fellowship artist members and, touchingly, some were donated by former aid recipients who wanted to give back to the organization that had helped them in their times of need. After expenses, the sale netted the Fellowship \$26,000. A special thanks goes to the artists, musicians and Jack Richeson & Co. for their donations.
